More Face-to-Face Training

Later in the year we will visit our more remote members so that they too can benefit from the experience of in-person training. We will also be exploring how to offer effective hybrid training so that all members can benefit from our visiting speakers.

WCFID Training

Focus on Parents

Parenting a child with intellectual disability is, like all parenting, full of highs and lows and can be a very rewarding experience, but it can also place a real strain on the parents and family. This term we are launching a monthly parent support group and as part of our Wednesday training sessions, Nicolette Ripepi will speak on Parent Support Strategies.

Intellectual Disability Month

As part of our marking of Intellectual Disability Month, we will provide a training session on Intellectual Disability for Educators at Eden School in Worcester on Friday 6 March and an online session for a broader audience on 11 March.

Programme Implementer Training

In Term 4 we completed Part One of the new Programme Implementer Training, which was offered in conjunction with the Rapid Response Team. The current group will complete Part Two this term.

We are in communicating with Western Cape Education Department's Inclusive and Specialised Education Support and hope to be able to hold another series of Programme Implementer training later this year, to accommodate the eight centres who have requested this training.



SPECIAL PROJECTS:

Following a needs analysis within the intellectual disability community the WCFID is planning a pilot project for 2026. Intrinsic to this process is the participation of people with intellectual disability as well as other development partners. This remains our fundamental approach to fostering and augmenting inclusion, participation to strengthen ties and to build collaborative partnerships. Knowing what steps to take when someone has a seizure not only protects people with epilepsy from injury but also increases a bystander's confidence and reduces their fear of seizures. In 2025 the seizure classification was updated and simplified.
